# 1. ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA OF THE 89th MEETING

It was moved by Councillor Dyson-Edmunds and seconded by Councillor Compton Hobbs to adopt the agenda of the 89<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Happy Valley-Goose Bay. All in favour. Motion carried unanimously.

# 2. DELEGATIONS

a. Debbie Keats-Ms. Keats addressed Council regarding a flooding situation that is happening at her property at 18 Rendell Crescent. She said the flooding started on May 13<sup>th</sup>, 2021 and now 40 days later they are still pumping water from their basement. She said she contacted the Town as soon as they discovered the flooding to see if it was a plumbing issue. Two staff members from the Town came in and confirmed it was not a plumbing issue; that it was ground water. Ms. Keats said she called their insurance provider and was told they are not covered for this sort of damage and that the repairs were their own responsibility. Ms. Keats said since then they have been constantly pumping and trying to dry up their basement. She said everything has been gutted and the devastation and destruction is heartbreaking; especially since they just completed a full renovation on their home. She spoke of the mental, physical, emotional and financial turmoil this has caused her family. She

said she has reached out to Council and the media with no resolve. Ms. Keats asked what is happening with the experts that are investigating the ground water situation and where are the reports and what are the next steps. She said she knows of 8-10 others that are dealing with ground water issues as well. Ms. Keats said she is pleading for help, for action to deal with this now.

#### 11. COUNCIL FORUM

Councillor Baikie said she is looking forward to the opening of the YMCA and encouraged people to take the tour being offered. She spoke of the Birch Island Boardwalk and encouraged all to get out and enjoy it. She said school is now out and wished everyone a great summer break. Councillor Compton Hobbs said she is looking forward to the opening of the YMCA as well. She said it's nice to see some restrictions lifting and programs getting back open. She said Summer Recreation program starts on July 5<sup>th</sup>. She said she is looking forward to having the new Development Regulations back soon and moving forward with some of the things Council is working on.

Councillor Dyson-Edmunds encouraged parents to talk to their kids about always wearing their bike helmets. She offered thanks to Curtis Coombs who is repairing and giving away bikes to kids that don't have one. She also offered thanks to the companies and other people who have donated bikes, parts and helmets. She said this good deed has grown and helped out many families. Councillor Dyson-Edmunds said she is also looking forward to the opening of the YMCA.

Deputy Mayor Pomeroy said he is disappointed that the Province has yet to reach out to Council since their statement and request for an emergency meeting. He spoke of the joint review panel report from several years ago where Nalcor identified community health issues in Upper Lake Melville. While there was no baseline information at the time, they asked the Town to provide baseline information after the project had already started. A panel concluded there would be adverse affects in HV-GB resulting from high wages including increased drug and alcohol use and mental health issues, as well as other social impacts, including housing shortage. The report also acknowledged that increased wages would offer increased social benefits. The panel noted that a positive social and economic outcome would be an ongoing commitment from all involved to address these issues, conduct careful monitoring, and provide resources to respond to the unexpected. The panel also noted that with appropriate mitigation and active adaptive management, there would be every opportunity to address the social impacts and assure benefits to the Town of HV-GB. The Capacity Agreement between the Province and HV-GB was to address additional administrative demands related to the project and to enable the Town to prepare a low-income housing strategy, in-migration, and economic downturn at the end of the construction phase. Deputy mayor Pomeroy said he still believes that many of the social problems the Town is facing in our community have been spawned by Muskrat Falls. He said the Government of the day failed to acknowledge there would be anything other than an economic impact. The social impacts are real, not just in the vulnerable population but throughout the community. The Marshall Government did provide the Town with a 3 year capacity agreement, but we never got one red cent from the Ball Government or the Furey Government; not even acknowledgement that there is an issue. He said meetings have been requested but the Province has turned a blind eye to them. He said he hopes when they finally do meet, they can bring these issues forward as the Town cannot deal with the social impacts taking place in our community.

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Mayor Andersen said they are reminded again tonight of the problem of ground water. He said it may seem like the Town is dragging their heels but it's a half million-dollar cost that wasn't budgeted. He said Council gave their word and is working to find a solution. Mayor Andersen said a lot of people are happy about the security the Town is providing in light of the statement Council made recently. He said the other issue is people are vulnerable and we need to find a way to help. He said they met with the Ball Government years ago and the response wasn't helpful. He said Council wants to hear from all groups in the community and band together to stop what is happening in our community. He said Council is meeting with Ministers but want to meet face to face with the Premier and he needs to come here and see what is happening. Mayor Andersen spoke of the job losses at 5 Wing Goose Bay and asked the PR Manager to draft a statement on behalf of Council. He said they will be writing letters to the Federal Ministers as well and that Council will be standing behind the employees at 5 Wing as they lobby for their jobs. Mayor Andersen thanked staff for the work they are doing.

There being no further business, a motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Councillor Compton Hobbs and seconded by Councillor Dyson-Edmunds. All in favour. Motion carried unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 6:35 PM.
